You must give credit to the person who took the photograph.

## How to cite a photograph found online

Photographer's Last name, first name. *Title of Photo*. Date photo was taken. Photograph. Name of Web Site. Web. Date the photo was accessed.

## Example:

Foley, Michael. *Melting Snows*, *Mt. Everest*. 2006. Photograph. *Flickr Creative Commons*. Web. 18 July 2012.

Photo citations should appear on a separate slide or frame at the end of the book trailer. If you use Animoto, type the citation in a Word document then save as a .jpg. Then add the page as an image at the end of the video.
